

Reporting life changes that could affect your eligibility

Changes in your life may change how much help you get to pay for childcare. With some changes, you may need to pay more or less of the cost of childcare.

Once you have help paying for childcare, you must call to report life changes that could affect your eligibility.

You will sign an Agreement, which says you understand that you must report these changes within 14 days.



What changes do you need to report within 14 days?

- Marriage
- Having a baby or staying home with a new baby
- Change in family size or the number of people who live in your home
- Increase in your household income of more than 20%
- Change in where you live, your phone number, or email information
- Quitting or losing your job
- Getting a new job
- Change in work, school, or training schedule
- You stop going to school, training, or high school
- You don't have a place to live

Who do I contact to report these changes?

You should call or email the childcare provider if your child is attending a program in a contracted slot, or the Childcare Resource & Referral Agency (CCR&R) that issued you a voucher.
